Weekend Trip to Makuri August 4th – 6th

It took me a year after my arrival in New Zealand from the UK to pluck up the courage to search the internet for the local caving club. By that time, my caving kit bag had mildewed into non-existence under the house and my Fisma had sprouted more rusticles than the Titanic.

A phone call to John was my first contact with the NZ caving scene. He suggested that I contact Barry. Makuri weekend August 5 – 6 August.

Cripes you should have seen the near new Mitsi Triton ute as we pulled out of Trouty's drive. Laden to the gunnels it was. 5 people, 5 sets of personal gear and caving gear, 4 mountain bikes, fence posts, warratahs, fencing wire and all the required tools to do the job.

On board were Rob Sp, Cassie, Jennifer, Trouty and Barry.

We lumbered over the hill, had a feed in Masterton and arrived at the shearer's quarters past most peoples bed time. Already in attendance were John L and Walter and we were joined in the morning by ex VCs Simon and Dion and after we had left for the day Judith and John R turned up.

Saturday morning dawned fine after overnight rain and we were all going to Famous Five except Trouty who had volunteered to erect the fence around the entrance to Crash Cave. Previous visits to this cave indicated that this entrance was a death trap for stock, both sheep and cows, which meant that a visit at the wrong time was a most unpleasant experience. And of course it was costing the farmer dough.

The said above ute was a 4WD so we had hoped to cart the fencing gear to the cave entrance using motor power. Well done to Cassie, Jennifer's daughter for whom this was her first cave; successfully completed. Famous Five is fun for the experienced but I can imagine that it would be frightening in places for first timers. Also great to have Rob Spillard along on his first caving trip in NZ since arriving from the UK a year ago. Quite, solid, dependable people you can't have enough of, especially on trips with beginners. What took you so long to get back into it Rob? And, I insulted him all weekend by calling him John, as if we didn't already have enough Johns.

The evening began with the usual selection of cheese and crackers followed by John L's famous devilled sausages washed down with a couple of bottles of red wine. A sheer fluke saw 3 bottles of R&B Special Reserve port bought by different people so we knocked them all off as well.
